Children's Sermon from Psalm 1; Jeremiah 17:5-10



Trees Planted by Water...

Children's Message on Spiritual Growth and Health - This message encourages children to stay closely connected to God in order to thrive and grow. Passages from both Psalms and Jeremiah reflect on tree metaphors, noting how relying on God's law and love nourishes and strengthens us. The message uses examples of withering and healthy plants to demonstrate the contrast in the natural world. In our spiritual lives, we flourish and thrive when we focus not on our own understanding, but on God.

Law/Gospel Theme: Using tree metaphors provides us with a beautiful reminder that it is God who works in and through us to do His will. A tree does not need to go to great lengths to soak up nourishment and produce fruit. It just has to be planted in the right place and receive water. So we, as Christians, do not have to somehow work hard to bear spiritual fruit and "earn" salvation. We just remember that we are to rely on God alone for all things, trusting not our own deceitful hearts, but in His love and strength.

Optional Materials: Pictures of (or real examples of) plants, both healthy and dry or dying.

Bible Passage: Psalm 1; Jeremiah 17:5-10

Children's Sermon Lesson (Psalm 1; Jeremiah 17:5-10) Trees Planted by Water

Greet children, holding pictures of trees, and/or examples of healthy and withering plants.

Hello, children of God! Well, I'll be honest: I'm not very great at keeping plants healthy. Sometimes people give me flowers or plants as presents, which is very nice, except that I can never seem to keep them alive very long. Do you know the difference between a healthy plant and one that's a bit more dried out? I'll let you take a look at these: which one do you think looks healthier? (*Hold up plant examples, if you have them. If not, hold up the pictures of the trees, one obviously healthy and the other dried out.*) How can you tell the differences? The trees/plants which are close to the water stay much healthier. They are able to soak up the nutrition that they need to grow. They have good soil and roots, and being near plenty of water allows them to produce fruit and remain strong and healthy. If plants don't get enough water, they wither up and shrivel up and eventually die.

Did you know that the Bible uses a lot of plant imagery to remind us of the importance of being spiritually healthy? God's Word talks a lot about being like a flourishing tree. In the first Psalm, we read that people who love God and meditate on His Word are like trees planted by water and producing fruit. The prophet Jeremiah said something similar: he described how people who try to trust in themselves are like dry shrubs. They don't have enough nourishment to grow and produce anything. When we abandon God and don't recognize His hand in our lives, we shrivel up spiritually.

When we focus on what God has done for us, and when we consider His love for us and stay rooted in Scripture, it's like being healthy trees. Our lives can bear "fruit" through the Holy Spirit. God's power gives us strength and allows us to be loving, kind, patient, joyful, faithful, gentle, peaceful, good, and self-controlled! God gives us wisdom as we pray and study His word. You know what's really neat? All of the power comes from God. Jeremiah says that we shouldn't trust in our own hearts, but lean on God for all things. This is like those trees planted by water, too. A tree doesn't have to do anything special to grow; it just has to have a good location and remain rooted in what nourishes it. We don't have to make ourselves better or rely on our own power in order for the Holy Spirit to work in us. We simply recognize that God does the heavy lifting, and trust in Him for hope and strength. God knows our hearts, and He promises to take care of us and allow us to grow in Him. What a beautiful picture of our health as people of God. Root yourself in Him, and grow solid like a tree!

that yields its fruit in its season,

and its leaf does not wither.

In all that he does, he prospers.

but are like chaff that the wind drives away.

- 5 Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous;
- 6 for the Lord knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish. -Psalm 1:1-6
